David Sarkisian started playing guitar when he was 8 years old. Over the years he played in pit bands for various theatrical productions, learning a new stringed instrument when necessary, including banjo, mandolin, and bass. Seems he was destined to play in an Irish band. In November 2021, he answered the call from his long-time friend, Paddy Myers, and joined in the Celtic Alchemy merriment.

Every Irish band needs a priest, and we are fortunate to have "The Percussionator" Don Priest holding down the groove. An original member of the band, Don's musical journey also began at an early age by sitting in on percussion with uncles and cousins at family gatherings, then playing drums and sax in high school. Now his assortment of drums, spoons, washboard and other 'banging toys' adds color and texture to our sound.

Our main goal is to have fun playing music and making sure our audiences enjoy themselves as we bring them along for the ride.

New Face on Campus

he Emeriti and Retirees Association (ERA) had the opportunity to tour the new Resnick Student Union in last spring. During our tour, Dr. Kent Willis, who oversees 300 employees and staff and had been in his new position two months, came and met our group. We were happy to meet him. We hope this article provides you with a broader scope and perspective about the work in the Division of Student Affairs and Enrollment Management. Dr. Willis, a native from Texas, previously worked in the University of Texas system. He brings an extensive background in student services and higher education. The Student Affairs Division at Fresno State houses student service offices and programs that include enrollment, campus discipline, academic advising, migrant services, counseling, student activities and the two student unions.



We recently had the opportunity to discuss various topics, as well as ideas about collaboration with Schools and Colleges. Dr. Willis acknowledges the value and expertise of Emeriti and retired faculty. He recognized that retired faculty represent an enormous resource base for current students, stating

that "Emeriti faculty are valuable partners to help propel the university forward and we welcome their input, ideas, and participation as key stakeholders."

Among his priorities are staff development and reimagining the student experience. He said, "It is also my goal to roll out a new divisional plan with learning outcomes for student affairs and enrollment management that develops student affairs educators who understand the learning process and have the ability to support students and recognize faculty expertise as the lifeblood of a strong community of learners."

Asked about ways to help the most vulnerable students who face numerous challenges, his immediate response was "We have already revamped the basic needs services under a newly-configured Office of Essential Needs. This office consolidates services like money management, food security, housing assistance, mentorship and general holistic case management."

Dr. Willis' views on the importance of transparency and accountability as related to students, faculty and staff safety measures are clear from his following statement: "As a member of the President's leadership team, I share his commitment to creating a culture of accountability and transparent values. Building and maintaining a safe and supportive campus environment for all faculty and staff requires an all-hands-on deck approach. I believe that we're moving in the right direction."

When asked what contributions Emeriti and retired faculty can make to the Division of Student Affairs, his comment was as follows: "Emeriti faculty would be awesome guest lecturers, mentors and advisors to various initiatives like two of our new areas that have been added to the DREAM Success Center on campus. The two new centers focus on Black Student Success, and Southeast Asian Student Success. These centers join the existing Native American Initiative and the DREAM Success Center."

He concluded his message to ERA members with: "It is my personal goal and commitment to the Emeriti faculty to be open to collaboration with ideas and constructive feedback. I believe it takes the entire campus community to create transformative student experience and would be wonderful to have guest lectures, advice and participation whenever and however possible. I am grateful to the ERA members and welcome feedback and ideas about building a strong and supportive Division of Student Affairs and Management that can propel students forward preparing them to engage meaningfully with faculty. "

President's Report: Meeting with Dr. Schmidtke, AVP for Faculty Affairs

On June 14, 2023, Dave Quadro and I attended a productive meeting with Dr. James Schmidtke, Interim Associate Vice-President for Faculty Affairs. At this meeting we had an opportunity to share with him important background information concerning the Emeriti and Retired Faculty Association (ERA)'s previous relationship with his office, and to present our need for more timely information concerning those faculty who are beginning to participate in the Faculty Early Retirement Program (FERP) as emeriti, and those who are retiring without involvement in the FERP program.

By way of background, prior to the advent of Covid 19, we had a good working relationship with the Faculty Affairs Office. They paid for our mailings and, for a time, provided us with retiree list. After Covid, because of changes in administration and staff, we no longer had that connection until we undertook this effort to reestablish it.

At present, we must wait many months to obtain this information from the Office of the Chancellor via the system-wide, CSU Emeritus and Retired Faculty and Staff Association (ERFSA) Office. We explained to Dr. Schmidtke how important it would be to receive the same information directly and much earlier from Faculty Affairs in order to bolster our efforts to recruit new members to ERA.

We were pleased that Dr. Schmidtke agreed to our request for a list of new participants in the FERP program as well as new retirees, to be provided at the end of each semester. He also agreed to provide a list of those on FERP and retirees from the past five years for our use in recruitment.

Near the end of our meeting, Dr. Schimdtke mentioned that he may wish to include a representative from ERA at new faculty or retiring faculty orientations in the future. As president of the ERA, I indicated that I would be available to assist in presenting our organization, as needed. It is encouraging to note that we should experience excellent cooperation in the future from the Office of Faculty Affairs.
